Dear Chairman Shelby, Vice Chairman Leahy, Chairwoman Lowey, and Ranking Member Granger:

As you work through appropriations bills for Fiscal Year 2021, we ask you to replenish and increase funding for accounts integral to wildfire response and recovery in any upcoming spending package. We also respectfully urge you to consider passing a disaster supplemental.

The number and scale of fires burning in Oregon, Washington, California, and other western states is unprecedented and demands federal support and sustained federal funding to protect and rebuild communities. Due to climate change and an unfortunate combination of droughts, a lack of proper forest management, dry forest conditions, windstorms, and dry fuel loads, horrific fires are raging across the West, burning through millions of acres of lands. These devastating fires have destroyed homes, businesses, critical infrastructure, wildlife and their habitats, high value timber lands, and lands of significant Tribal importance. In Oregon, roughly ten percent of the population remains under evacuation orders. California has seen one of these fires become the largest in state history and five other 2020 fires have made their way into the top 20. And fires have burned through nearly 800,000 acres in Washington state, the size of roughly 15 Seattles.

First responders and firefighters are working around the clock to contain these fires and respond to the immediate needs of local communities. But states are distressingly low on funds in light of the ongoing global coronavirus pandemic. While the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and other federal partners have mobilized to assist states, more work remains as communities begin to assess and understand the scope of damages to properties and natural resources. Congress has previously acted in the aftermath of wildfires to provide federal relief, and accordingly, we ask that you make funds available for necessary wildfire response and recovery, including but not limited to the following programs:

- FEMA Disaster Relief Fund (DRF)
- FEMA Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG)
- FEMA Fire Prevention and Safety Grants (FP&S)
- FEMA Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Firefighters Program (SAFER)

- FEMA Fire Management Assistance Grants Program (FMAG)
- FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program
- Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery Program
- Economic Development Administration Grants
- U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Farm Service Agency's Disaster Assistance Program
- USDA Farm Service Agency's Emergency Forest Restoration Program
- USDA United States Forest Service Wildland Fire Management
- USDA United States Forest Service Forest and Rangeland Research
- USDA United States Forest Service State and Private Forestry Program
